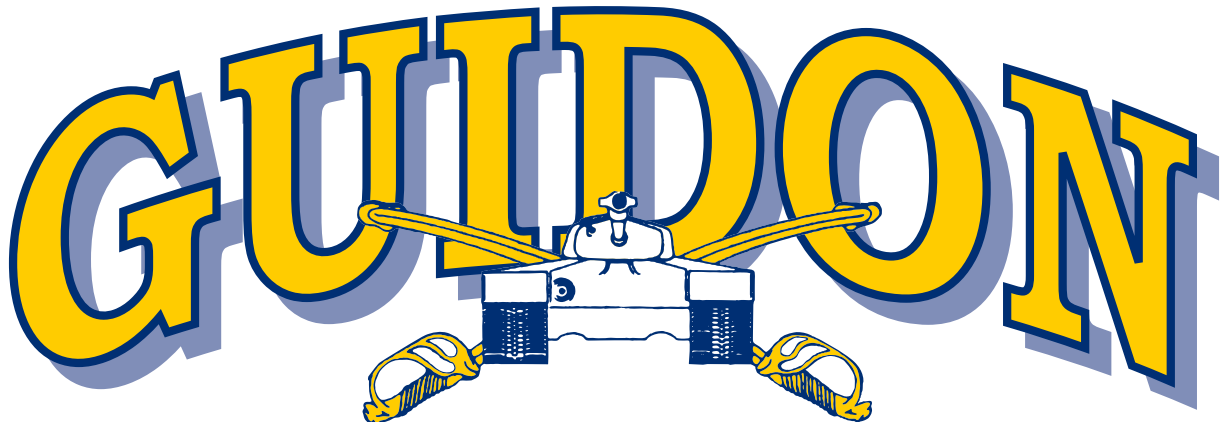

MEET THE ADJUTANT FOR THE OMA ALUMNI 2024 REUNION



Bill Ramsay graduated from high school in 1961 after spending two years at OMA, achieving the rank of Master Sergeant, and was lead guitar player in the OMA Rock and Roll Band. He later graduated from The University of Tulsa with a Bachelor of Science in Business Management. Bill began his 40-year career in telecommunications at Southwestern Bell, working in the mailroom while attending college. After graduation he held many different positions in Oklahoma and in St. Louis including sales, technical support and marketing. He then joined AT&T at the time of the breakup of the Bell system. In 1986, Bill was hired by WiTel, a subsidiary of The Williams Companies in Tulsa, at the time of the rapid growth and development of WiTel and WorldCom. He became a five-time recipient of the WiTel Presidents Club Award.

During this time, he and a team of executives worked on planning and executing several acquisitions, along with negotiating large domestic and international customer contracts. Verizon ultimately acquired the company, and he retired from there in 2007 as director of global wholesale accounts, responsible for a sales and technical support group with an annual revenue base of over \$300 million. Since leaving Verizon, Bill has been developing a portrait and real estate photography business, along with the development of an internet marketing company.

Bill has been actively involved in civic and community activities for many years including The United Way, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club, Junior Achievement and the Adopt-a-School program. He has been active in the Oklahoma Military Academy Alumni Association, serving as president of the board of directors for three years, and currently as chairman of the OMA Museum committee. He was selected as an OMA Distinguished Alumnus in 2014, OMA Hall of Fame in 2018, and received the Lt. Gen. William E. Potts Award of Excellence in 2023. Bill still plays his guitar and harmonica occasionally, and he and his wife Deann reside in Tulsa and have three children and four grandchildren.

"OMA was a place for unique experiences. It was difficult at first, learning new ways, new rules, and learning to succeed. As time went on, it became a way of life. After my first semester, with Rabbit Period, I never thought I'd look forward to fall and the beginning of a new school year. Those are memories I will treasure always and never forget. Even more important is the Alumni Association and its accomplishments. When I met Dr. Mosier at his invitation, and discovered his thoughts about forming the association, I was shocked to say the least."

Like most cadets, I felt like OMA had ended on a bad note, to the point that we probably weren't welcome on campus. I found out that we were wrong, and nothing could have been further from the truth. Had it not been for the association, most of us would have lost track of close friends from around the country and never seen them again. Of all the things the association has accomplished, memorials, endowments, and the museum, it has also afforded us the opportunity to gather, remember old times, and rekindle the friendships we had at OMA."

"As you know Cadets were quite 'Resourceful.' This is a true story. The statute of limitations has long expired if they would have even applied."

The winter of 1970-71 was very cold and lots and lots of snow. Tall snow drifts and snowplow piles were everywhere on campus. Snowball attacks, snowball fights, snowball wars, Mess Hall trays used for sledding, all a good time.

"The weather report called for extreme freezing cold one school night. There had been conversations about whether classes would be cancelled the next day. A couple of cadets came up with a plan to make sure they were. They acquired a fire hydrant wrench, and after lights out at 10 p.m., they proceeded to open a few fire hydrants going down the "Hill" to Claremore. Needless to say, their mission was accomplished! The water flooded and froze solid on the road to the academy. Classes were cancelled as nobody could get up the hill to the Academy. We had a free day which was used for more "snow activities." For the record this Cadet no longer remembers who actually done it, but it wasn't me!

I was most impressed by this view, and my trepidation on transferring was immediately muted by the expectations there invoked by that stellar view against a robin's egg blue sky background. Flags were still at half-staff in honor of the late John F. Kennedy, assassinated seven weeks prior. Needless to say, my expectations were exceeded by those subsequent 2.5 years of attendance."

A pillar of Rogers State in all three of its incarnations from Oklahoma Military Academy to Claremore Junior College to Rogers State College, Luther Martin first came to College Hill as OMA's baseball coach in 1968. When OMA transitioned into Claremore Junior College in 1971, Martin continued leading the Spartan baseball program amassing a record of 249-107 over 14 seasons, never finishing a season with a losing record. His most successful season came in 1978, when he guided CJC to a 31-2 record and an appearance in the NJCAA Region 2 Championship. That year, he helped guide fellow Hillcat Hall of Famer Steve Crawford to a 5-2 record on the mound with a 1.37 ERA as Crawford was named the NJCAA Region 2 Pitcher of the Year and was named to the Regional All-Star team. Martin made a coaching career recruiting the best baseball players from talent-rich, local high schools including Claremore, Inola and Salina among others, giving those young men a chance to play baseball at another level and earn an education in the process. In 1983, he was promoted to athletic director of

the newly renamed Rogers State College, overseeing the institution's Health, Physical Education and Recreation department. Martin served in various roles for Rogers State until his retirement in 1994, including a heavy involvement with student recruitment.





ROGERS STATE UNIVERSITY GOLD PROGRAM SEES RECORD GROWTH

Rogers State University has a leadership program that's as good as gold. The Guard Officer Leadership Development (GOLD) program is the premier leadership program for Oklahoma National Guard soldiers attending Rogers State University.

In recent years, the program has seen record growth, with this semester boasting the highest number of officer candidates in the program's history.

"Currently, we have 24 officer candidates enrolled in the GOLD program at RSU. This is the largest number of recruits we've ever had at once," said Sergeant First Class (SFC) Ruben Gonzalez, National Guard member and non-commissioned officer in charge. "This speaks highly about the quality of the program and its benefits to those who go through it."

The GOLD program provides academic leadership training which is built into the candidate's college curriculum. During classes, leadership labs, physical training and field exercises, students learn firsthand what it takes to be a leader, to motivate groups and to conduct missions as an officer of the U.S. Army.

SFC Gonzalez, who has been with the program since 2019, said positive word of mouth has helped foster interest in the GOLD program and its benefits to potential candidates.

"Unlike regular National Guard recruits, GOLD program members are non-deployable through graduation, going through the drills with their unit here on campus and with their primary focus being on leadership. They get the (National Guard) tuition waiver, which pays for 100% of their tuition and fees, and OMA (Oklahoma Military Academy) alumni have established scholarship endowments and restricted scholarships to help with on-campus housing, books, and their board expenses, if funding is not available," he said. "They receive paid training and all benefits of being in the military."

After obtaining 90 college credits, officer candidates between their junior and senior year are given the opportunity to attend Officer Candidate School at historic Fort Meade in South Dakota or Fort McClellan in Alabama. Students then receive their commission and are promoted to the rank of 2nd Lieutenant. Their commission, combined with a degree from RSU, gives students increased opportunities in both their military and civilian careers.

"I joined the program in part to learn how to be a better leader, to gain knowledge to leverage my unique qualities and embrace any opportunity to challenge myself," said Muldrow native Shailey Evans, RSU junior and RSU GOLD Program officer candidate. "In the time



I've spent with the program so far, I've learned a lot about some of the main things I'll be tested on at OCS (Officer Candidate School), such as land navigation, drill and ceremony, battle drills, operation orders and the qualities needed to be a good leader.

"GOLD (Program) gives all the candidates opportunities to be in student leadership positions and get a good experience of what the responsibility of being in charge of others consists of," she continued. "I feel that has played a crucial part in my readiness and confidence to advance to pre-OCS, and then OCS this summer."

Evans, a medical molecular biology major at RSU, also commended SFC Gonzalez and other GOLD Program members for exemplifying leadership and camaraderie.

Every year, GOLD Program candidates meet with members of the OMA Alumni Association at the annual OMA reunion.

"As has often been said, the truly great things in life are worth waiting for, and that's certainly true when it comes to waiting so long to get boots back on the Hill," said Dr. Danette Boyle, executive director of the OMA Alumni Association. "I can hardly wait every year until the OMA Alumni Reunion when alumni come home and meet one-on-one with our military students during our reunion weekend.

"It's always exciting and a unique reunion for all when our alumni have the opportunity to meet their OMA legacy GOLD Program students," she said.

SFC Gonzalez said his greatest satisfaction in being involved in the program is watching the growth of the recruits, both as individuals and as future soldiers.

"I enjoy training soldiers. It's rewarding for me to watch them start out as freshmen – as young, immature teenagers – and over time, see them mature and develop into disciplined officers," he said.

"Being a member of the GOLD Program has helped instill more confidence in myself and my leadership skills, which enabled my ability to succeed at OCS and become a competent officer in the Army National Guard," Evans said.

GOLD enlistment applicants are eligible for all Army National Guard incentives.

Combined with an RSU degree, completion of the GOLD program allows recruits to be a National Guard officer, with greatly increased career opportunities as a civilian, following their time in the service.

OMA ALUMNI ASSOCIATION SALUTES JAMES H. MORRISON '52

OMA ALUMNI BOARD OF DIRECTORS LIFETIME APPOINTMENT, 1933-2023

Jim Morrison, '52, was instrumental in defining the OMA legacy for future generations by selflessly giving back his time and talents. From hardscrabble roots, Morrison was able to attend OMA and then flourish at the rigorously demanding school. Morrison's early involvement at OMA showed the first signs of a lifetime of association with the institution. Under Morrison's picture in the 1952 yearbook is a list of his OMA honors and activities, including PFC., Cpl., Sgt., M/Sgt., College Football, College Basketball, Horseback Riding, Tennis, "O" Club, President of Chevron Society, Cadet Capers, Hop Committee, Military Achievement Ribbon, Merit Ribbon, Honor Roll Ribbon, Athletic Ribbon, and Drill Team. He eventually graduated from junior college in 1952. He went on to attend the University of Oklahoma on an athletic scholarship and participated in ROTC, where he was a Cadet colonel. After graduation, he served two years of active duty in the Army and served three decades with the U.S. Army Reserves, retiring as a colonel.

In his business career, he began working as an industrial engineer with Colgate Palmolive Co., and later as a sales engineer with the Universal Atlas Cement Division of United States Steel Corp., which was the first step in his long and distinguished career of owning concrete companies in Oklahoma and Kansas.

He was passionate about continuing the OMA legacy, serving for many years on the board of directors, being a member of the RSU President's Board of Advisors, chairman of the Rogers State College Foundation Board of Directors and member of the UCT/RSC Board of Regents, and faithfully participating in OMA events over the years. He was selected as an OMA Distinguished Alumnus in 1990, OMA Hall of Fame in 1996, and received the Lt. Gen. William E. Potts Award of Excellence in 2016. A passionate believer in the power of education, he also has given back to OMA's legacy institutions, with service to the schools' governing boards and foundations. Morrison and his wife Norma established the Jim and Norma Morrison Scholarship Endowment at RSU, as well as supporting initiatives both small and large on campus, including the establishment of the Oklahoma Army National Guard's GOLD program at RSU.

Whenever there has been a need, Jim stood on the front line, ready and willing to carry on the OMA legacy while strengthening educational opportunities for all Oklahomans.

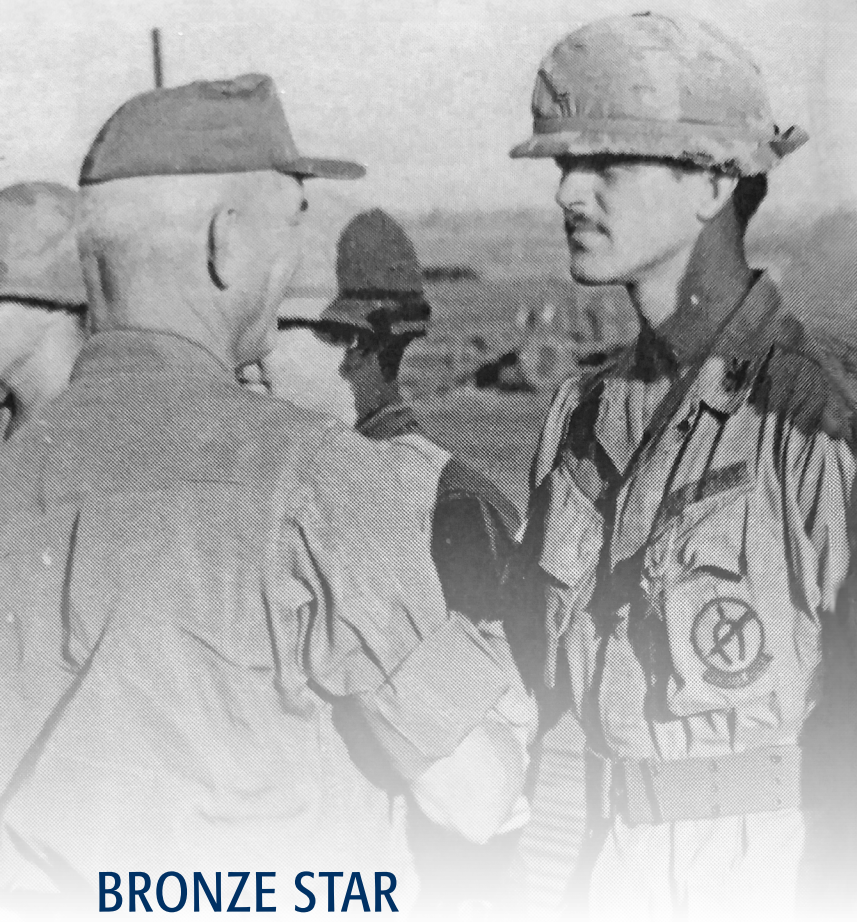

ATTENTION OMA ALUMNI GIVING OPPORTUNITIES

Since 1982, The Rogers State University Foundation endowed scholarship program has been made possible by the generous support of alumni and friends, foundations and corporations. Many students at RSU are very worthy and deserving of scholarships and could benefit a great deal from additional endowments. Establishing an endowment can be an important part of your legacy and your life. Establishing a scholarship would honor you for all you have accomplished at OMA and during your professional career. Please find information below on how you can get started to develop an endowment. Please keep in mind you can establish a scholarship endowment in memory or in honor of someone special.

Establishment of Scholarship Endowments

By establishing an endowment, your gift continues forever, creating a legacy of hope and opportunities. To fully fund an Endowment at RSU, a minimum gift of \$25,000 is needed. This may be given as a one-time gift or may be paid over a five-year period. The donor may establish criteria that must be met in order for a student to qualify to receive the endowment. Only a percentage of the endowment earnings is allocated each year for scholarship spending, which typically ranges between 2.5 and 4.0 percent of the endowment corpus. This percentage is determined annually by the RSU Foundation Investment Committee. The RSU Office of Development works in cooperation with RSU Financial Aid to award the endowments each year. Endowments may be established in your name or in honor of someone you hold dear to your heart.

Steps to establish an OMA Scholarship Endowment

- A minimum gift of \$25,000 will establish a named endowment. This may be a one-time gift or paid over a period of years.
- Your gift creates the endowment fund that remains permanently intact and is carefully managed by the RSU Foundation.
- A portion of the earnings is used to assist the RSU students with tuition and fees, while another portion is reinvested to increase the principal balance of your endowment.
- Your named endowment continually grows over time and provides scholarships to generations of students.
- Your named endowment will establish a permanent legacy for you or your loved ones or a beloved teacher or coach from OMA.

The Oklahoma Military Academy Killed In Action Memorial serves as a permanent tribute to the OMA cadets who lost their lives during military service. Unveiled in 2011, the memorial is a black granite pyramid etched with the names of the more than 100 known cadets who made the ultimate sacrifice during service abroad.

The OMA KIA Memorial is situated between two of the oldest and most iconic buildings on the campus — Preparatory Hall and Meyer Hall, which are both listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The memorial has been constructed where the original OMA Post Office once stood.

Funds to build the memorial were provided through generous contributions from OMA alumni, families and RSU supporters. The amount raised above the cost of the memorial has been placed in a permanent endowment to preserve the memorial for posterity, to provide scholarships for RSU students and to maintain the OMA Museum.

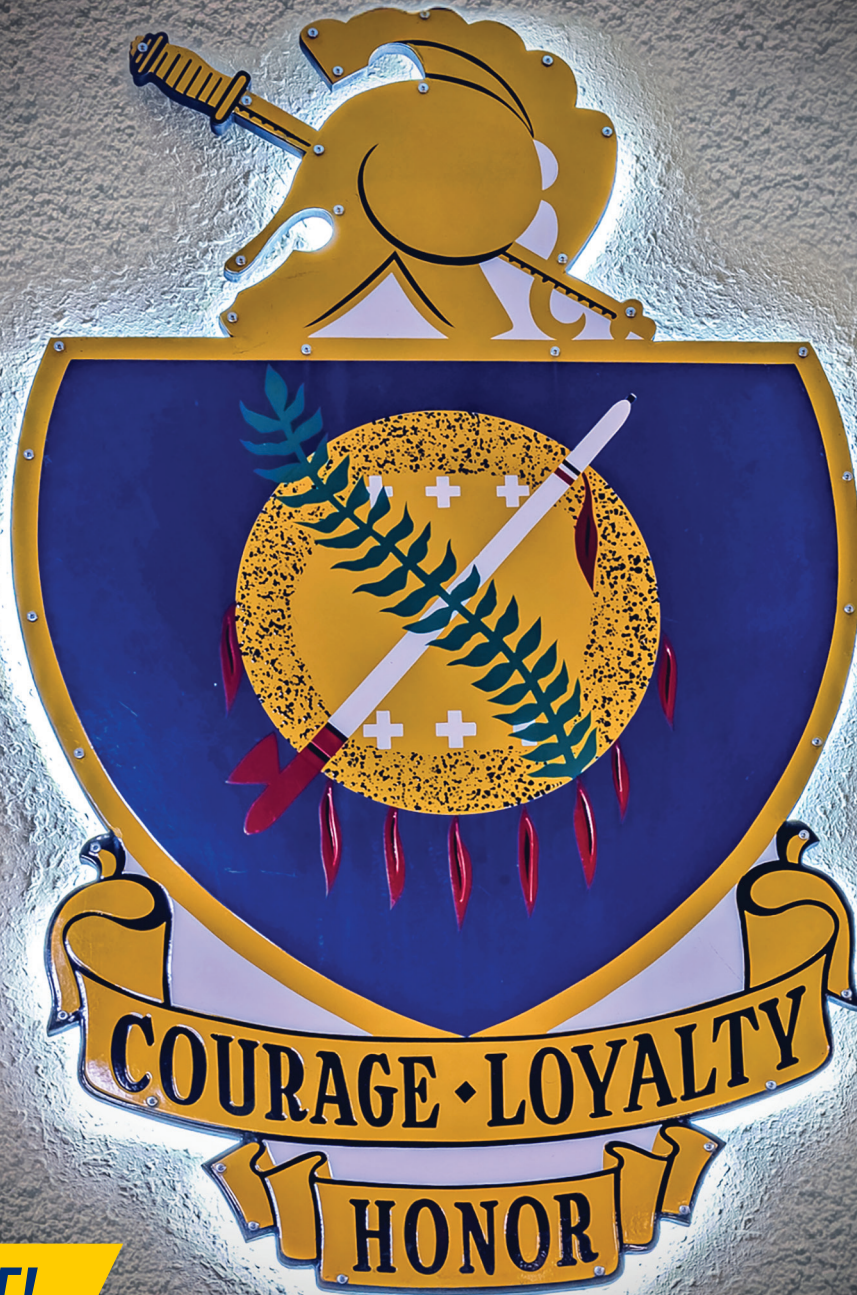

Rogers State University President Dr. Larry Rice has been named the Claremore Chamber of Commerce's Citizen of the Year. This distinction was bestowed upon Dr. Rice at the Chamber's annual State of the Chamber Annual Meeting and Awards Luncheon, held Jan. 25 in the Dr. Carolyn Taylor Center at RSU. During the annual event, the Chamber recognizes citizens of distinction for their contribution to and positive impact upon the Claremore community. Presenting the award was incoming Chamber Chairman Grant Gingerich.

"Today, we're here to celebrate a remarkable individual who has made a lasting impact on our community," Gingerich began. "New programming in a business or non-profit or educational institution occurs by having great leaders with vision and determination. Today's recipient represents a growing and prestigious institution that has flourished under his guidance for the past 15 years."

Gingerich cited RSU's new Bachelor of Science in chemical engineering degree program, as well as its new offerings in cybersecurity, drone technology and graphic design, along with the expansion of other graduate offerings as examples of the university's growth.

"New programs come from great vision and the hard work is done behind the scenes, including overseeing staff, development and operations in the university," he said. "He has also dedicated his work and his life to the betterment of our community. He has been a mentor to many and has always been willing to lend a hand to those in need. After noting the award recipient to have served as a "source of inspiration and pride for all," Gingerich announced the award's recipient to be Dr. Rice, congratulating him and telling him that Claremore is honored to have him as a member of its community. Dr. Larry Rice has served as the 14th president of Rogers State University since 2008. He is an Oklahoma native, with more than 40 years of experience in higher education. He began his academic career in 1979 as a full-time faculty member at RSU, when it was still Claremore Junior College, where he taught classes in criminal justice, psychology, and sociology. From 1979 to 1986, he was Director of the Applied Science Division and from 1986 to 1991, he was Associate Director of Academics for the Pryor campus of Rogers State College.

He earned a Doctor of Education from Oklahoma State University. He also earned both a Master of Arts in education as well as a Bachelor of Science in criminal justice from Northeastern State University.

Prior to becoming president of RSU, Rice served in several roles at the University of Tulsa, including interim vice president of institutional advancement, director of public affairs, and executive assistant to the president. He also served in the Oklahoma House of Representatives from 1991 to 2004, representing District 8 including Rogers, Mayes, and Wagoner Counties.

RSU PRESIDENT DR. LARRY RICE ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT



Sixteen years after beginning his work as president designate of Rogers State University, Dr. Larry Rice has announced he will retire as president in early July 2024.

"It has been an honor and privilege to serve as president at RSU, the place where my higher education career started," Rice said. "The Hill holds a special place in my heart, and Peggy and I have cherished every moment here."

"I am grateful to the Board of Regents of the University of Oklahoma for the opportunity to lead RSU and its continuing support of our mission. I also offer my thanks to the employees, students, alumni and supporters for their gifts of time, talent and resources that have helped to establish RSU as a premier regional university in Oklahoma."

Rice began his academic career in 1979 as a full-time faculty member at RSU, which was then known as Claremore Junior College, before transitioning into administrative posts at the University of Tulsa. He served the citizens of Oklahoma as a state representative in House District 8 from 1986 to 2004, rising to the leadership post of Majority Floor Leader.

Rice's tenure has seen RSU expand academic offerings and campus infrastructure.

The university streamlined academic programs to focus on degrees that prepared career-ready students. Under his leadership, RSU became a leader in online delivery of courses and is regularly among the top regional universities in concurrent enrollment. Rice led efforts to begin graduate programs and in 2023 RSU began a bachelor's degree program in chemical engineering.

He also led efforts to build infrastructure, including finishing construction and opening the Dr. Carolyn Taylor Center in 2009. Other projects included the Diamond Sports Complex, new on-campus housing and Chapman Dining Hall. In 2010, the university expanded and renovated Baird Hall to meet the needs of a rapidly growing student body. With an eye on expanding workforce opportunities, RSU partnered with the MidAmerica Industrial Park in Pryor to build a campus in the park.

Rice spearheaded private fundraising efforts with the Rogers State University Foundation and was instrumental in securing some of the school's largest private gifts. He also led RSU's efforts to move its athletics programs to NCAA Division II and saw its women's softball team win the Division II national title in 2022.

Beside him during his tenure was his wife, First Lady Peggy Rice. She was an active advocate for RSU and was involved in numerous community and campus activities including the President's Leadership Class and the Honors Program. The First Lady deployed the President's Residence as a fund raising, friend raising and student-focused event venue. Celebrating her highly successful career in business and her contributions to RSU, friends created the Peggy Rice Award in Business Excellence endowment in 2021 to recognize a top graduating senior in business administration.

"President Rice has been an example of outstanding servant leadership and through his vision Rogers State University has excelled in fulfilling its academic and service mission," said Natalie Shirley, chair of the Board of Regents of the University of Oklahoma, Rogers State University and Cameron University. "He has earned the respect of the Regents and I know they share in offering my thanks and best wishes to him and his wife, Peggy."

The OU Board of Regents will develop a leadership transition plan for RSU.

RSU'S ONLINE PROGRAM AGAIN RANK NATIONALLY



The U.S. News and World Report has named RSU's online degree programs as among the top five within the state of Oklahoma and ranked nationally among the U.S. News and World Report's 2024 Best Online Programs.

The rankings were released Feb. 7.

A pioneer in online education, RSU offers one master's degree, seven bachelor's degrees, and seven associate degrees entirely online. Since the inception of its online distance education program in 1992, RSU has earned distinction as the first university in Oklahoma – and one of the first in the nation – to offer college degrees entirely via the internet.

"We are grateful for this recognition by U.S. News and World Report, demonstrating the quality of our online programs at Rogers State University," said RSU President Dr. Larry Rice. "The quality academics, the personal attention, and the care we show to our students sets an RSU education apart. I am excited to see us rise in these rankings and I am excited for the future of online learning at RSU."

RSU ranked 197th overall out of the entire nation in the Best Online Bachelor's Programs, up 26 spots from the previous year's national ranking at 223. RSU is the fifth ranked school in this category from the state of Oklahoma.

Additionally, Rogers State University was ranked 114th in Best Online Bachelor's in Business Programs, up 27 spots from last year's ranking of 141. This placed RSU as tied for the fourth highest ranking in Oklahoma in this category.

RSU also ranked in the 260-345 ranking (this section doesn't assign individual ranks) in Best Online MBA Programs, equivalent to its placement last year, when the classification was 261-344. RSU tied for the fifth-place ranking for Oklahoma schools in this category.

IMPORTANT UPDATE ON THE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE RSU NURSING PROGRAM AND ST. FRANCIS HOSPITAL



In spring 2023, Saint Francis Health System and RSU announced a partnership to launch an extended campus of RSU's Bachelor of Science in Nursing program, housed inside the Saint Francis Hospital in Tulsa. With generous funding from the William K. Warren Foundation, Saint Francis Hospital has renovated a 6,000-square-foot area within the hospital that houses a state-of-the-art simulation center and classrooms designed to educate the next generation of healthcare professionals.

The first cohort started this semester in January 2024.

Future cohorts will be added with 16 students per semester, ultimately with up to 64 nursing students – 32 juniors and 32 seniors – each year at Saint Francis. The RSU nursing faculty help facilitate classroom learning and teach labs and simulations.
