Alumni Survey

During the summer 2012 semester, Rogers State University (RSU) conducted a survey of alumni to assess the current situation and level of satisfaction of students who graduated from RSU during the summer, fall, or spring of the previous year. In 2010, RSU selected the *ACT Alumni Survey* paper survey as the instrument used to collect information from RSU alumni. Included in this year's alumni survey were 30 additional questions regarding background information and how RSU contributed to their personal growth.

Methodology

For the 2012 Alumni Survey, RSU mailed surveys to 526 students who graduated during the 2010-2011 academic year. This list of 526 students was provided by the RSU Alumni Office. Along with the survey, each packet contained a letter describing the survey and a chance to enter a drawing for a \$100 Wal-Mart gift card. Participation was voluntary. Of the 526 surveys mailed out, 63 (13%) alumni returned completed surveys and 27 packets were returned unopened with invalid addresses. Of the 63 completed surveys, 19 (30%) said RSU could contact their employer about completing an employer survey.

Results

Of the 63 respondents, 23% reported being 23 or 24 years of age which is similar to the alumni population in which 22% are 23 or 24 years old. Seventy-two (72) percent of the respondents were female; however, 67% of the alumni population is female. Nineteen (19) percent of respondents identified themselves as Native American while 12% of the alumni population is reported to be Native American. Native American (19%) and Caucasian (75%) respondents represented 94% of all respondents. Fifty-four (54) percent of respondents are employed full-time, 10% are employed part-time, 20% are continuing their education, and 9% are employed and continuing their education. The other 7% are either caring for a home/family or unemployed.

When asked "If you could start college over, would you choose to attend this college," 53% of respondents said "Definitely Yes" compared to the national norm of 44%. Additionally, 49% stated they would definitely choose the same major compared to the national norm of 39%. Fifty-four (54) percent of respondents listed "location" as the primary reason for attending RSU. Eighty-six (86) percent stated a college education has improved their quality of life.

Comparing alumni perceptions of *education at this college contribute to your personal growth* with national norms, RSU is below the national norm in only one (1) area: *caring for your own physical and mental health*.

When ranking “satisfaction with aspects of present job”, location and working conditions are the most satisfying. Seventy-one (71) percent of the respondents primarily attended the Claremore campus. Additionally, 40.3% of the respondents did not borrow money to attend college. Sixty-six (66) percent agreed that general education courses and 87% agreed that courses in their major contributed to their personal growth. Most alumni said study abroad/international experiences, internships for academic credit, residential life, intramural athletics, and intercollegiate athletics was not applicable when asked about contribution to personal growth.

Implication

Periodic solicitation of alumni opinions concerning university services and RSU’s contribution to personal growth meets policy requirements of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and addresses the criteria for accreditation established by Higher Learning Commission. The findings from the annual Alumni Survey may be used for institutional and alumni planning, preparation for the future and improvement of student learning. Specifically, these data provide evidence of the achievement of the RSU Mission, Strategic Plan and departmental goals and outcomes.

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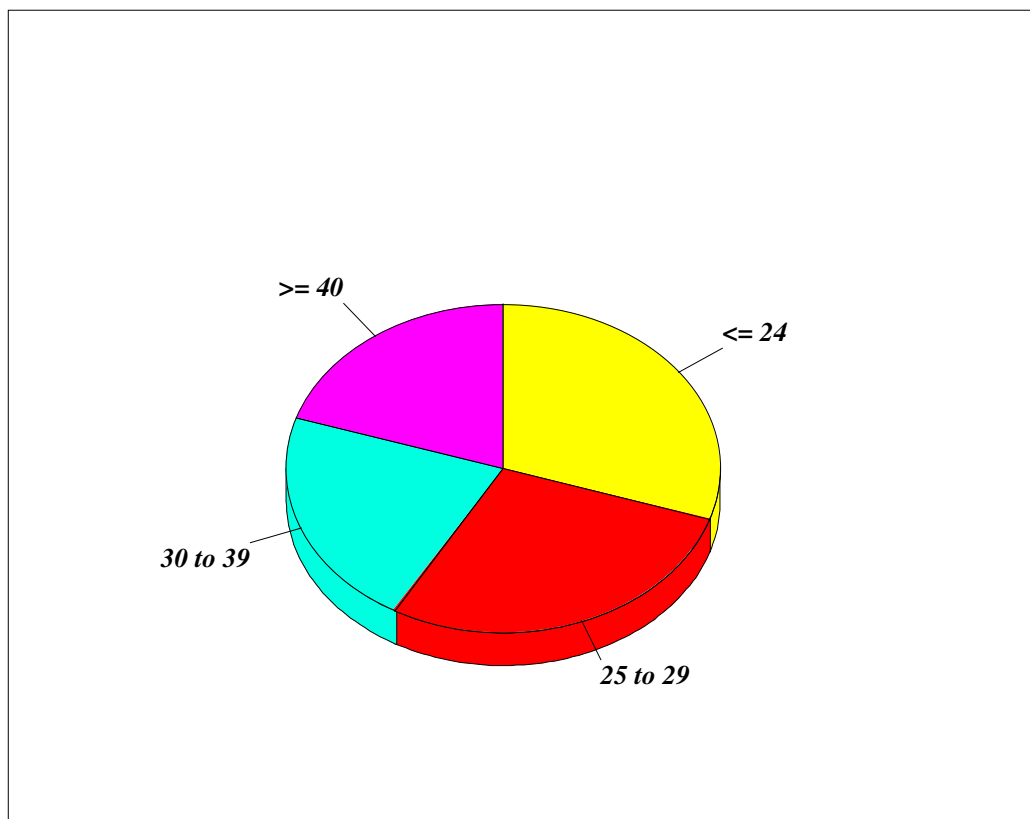


Figure 1. Section I - Background Information, Item B: Age

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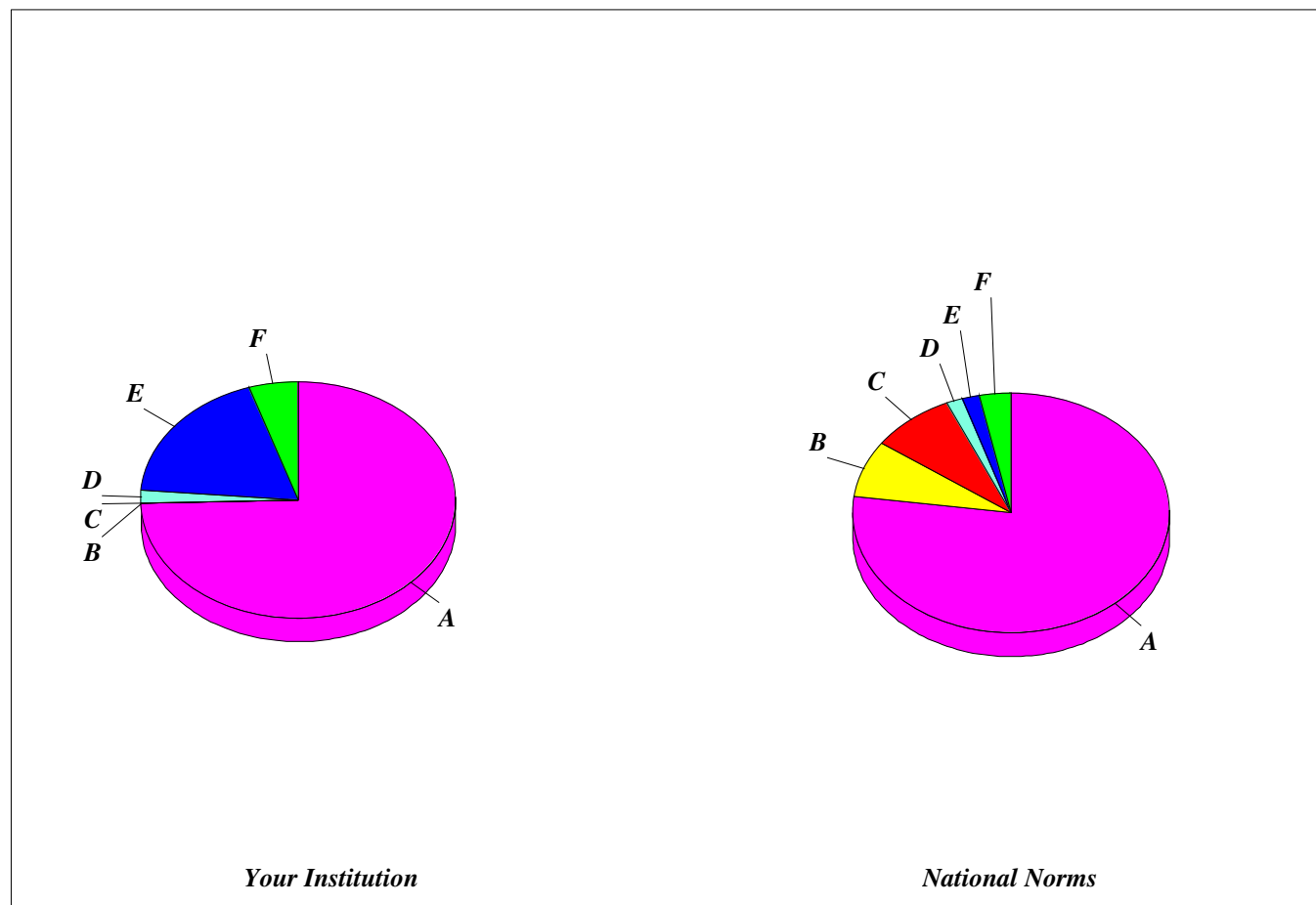


Figure 2. Section I - Background Information, Item C: Racial/Ethnicity

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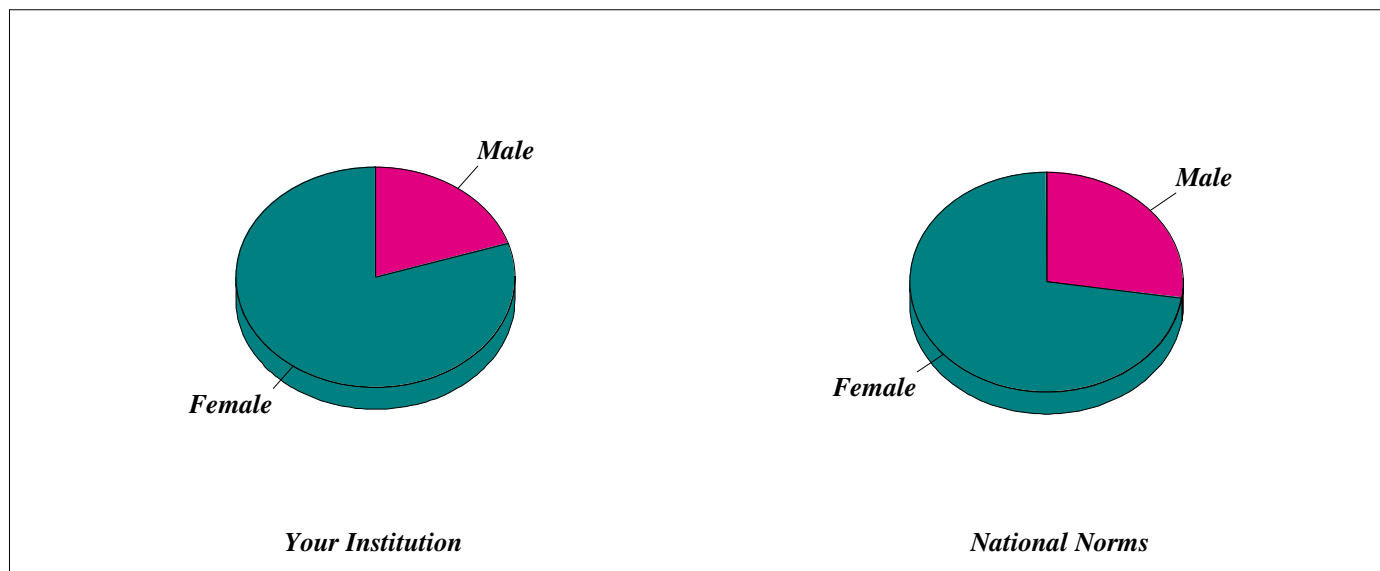


Figure 3. Section I - Background Information, Item G: Sex

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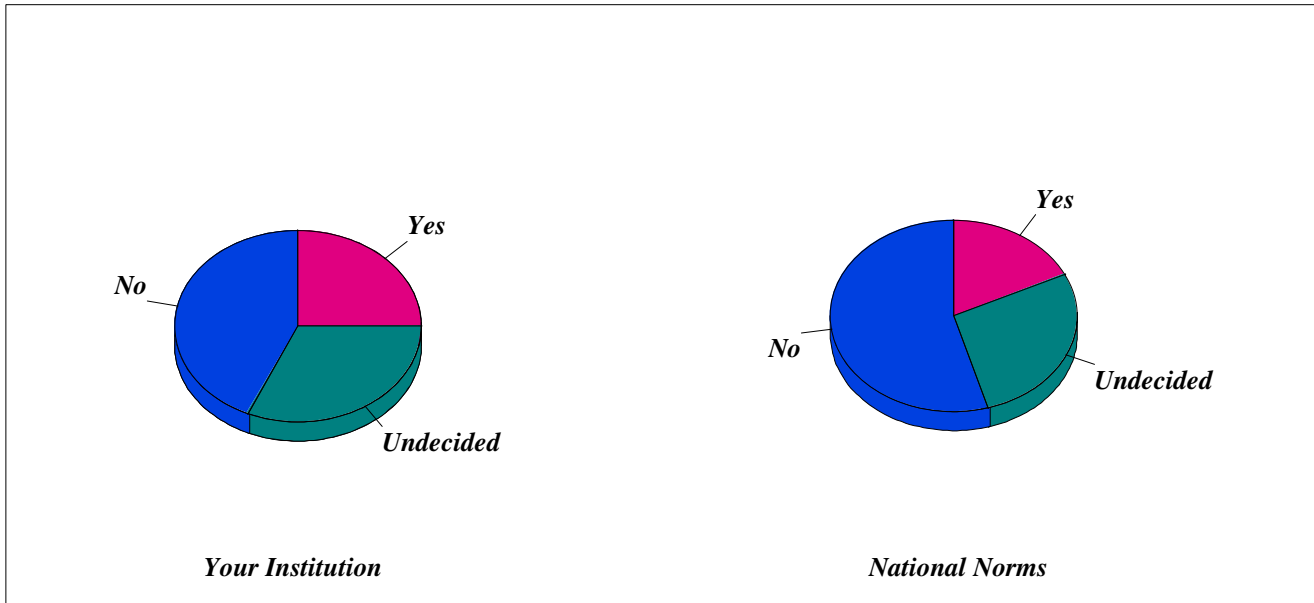
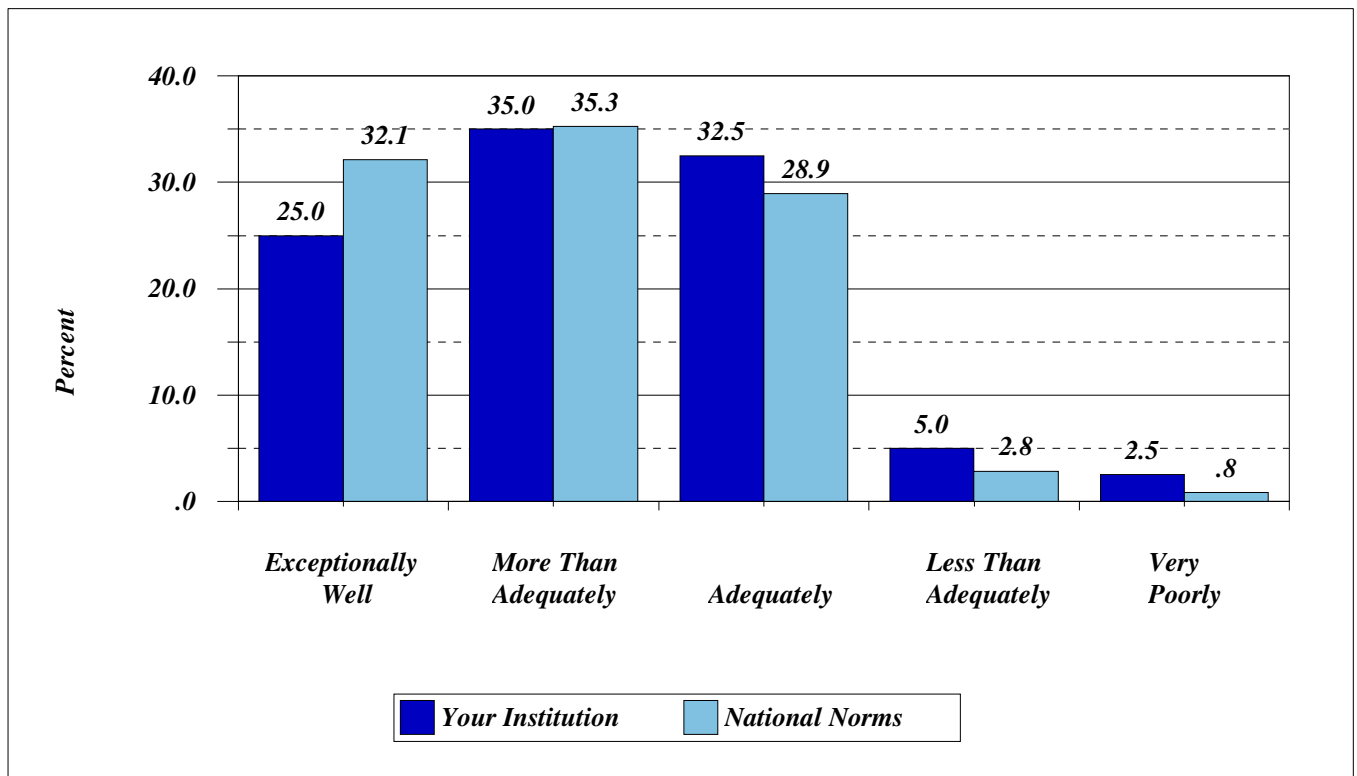


Figure 4. Section I - Background Information, Item M: Do you plan to attend this college in the future?

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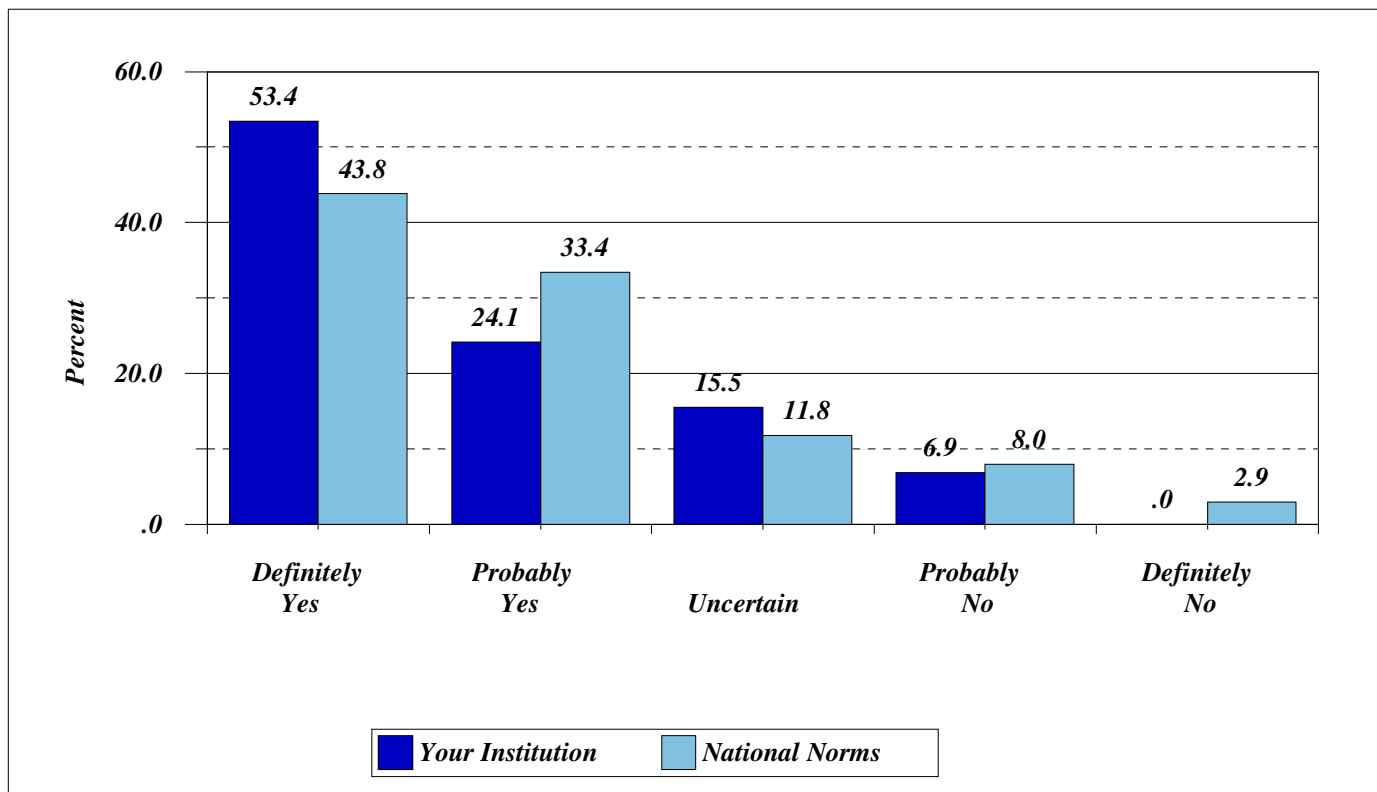


Figure 6. Section III - College Experiences, Item B:

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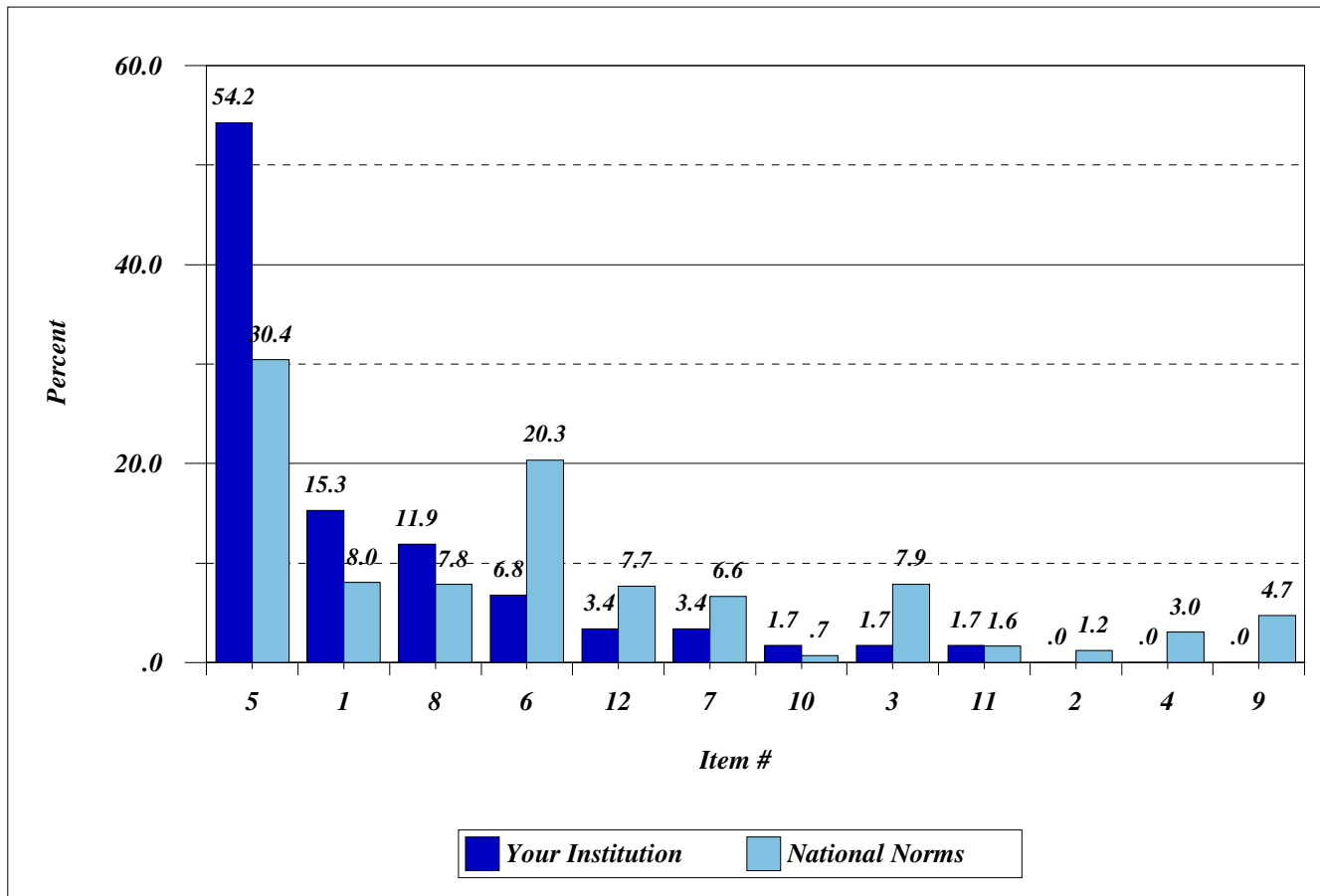


Figure 7. Section III - College Experiences, Item F: Primary Reason for Attending this College

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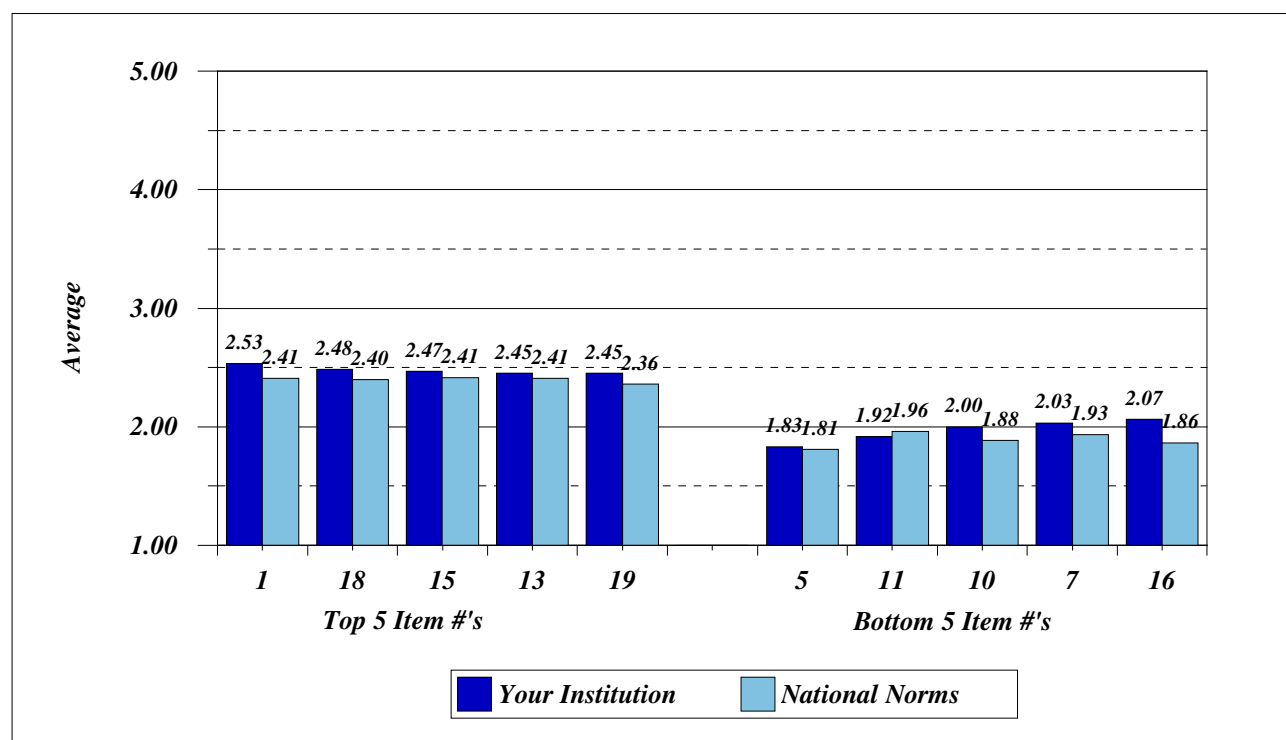


Figure 8. Section III - College Experiences, Item I:

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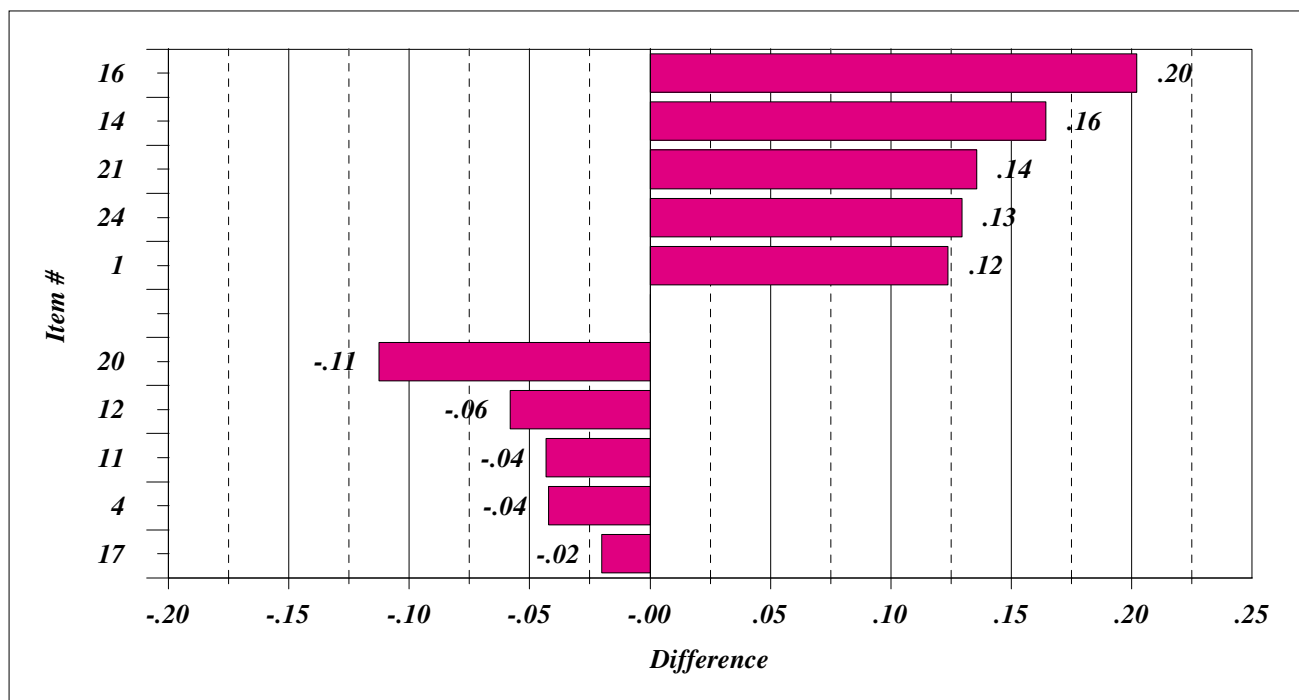


Figure 9. Section III - College Experiences, Item I: Personal Growth

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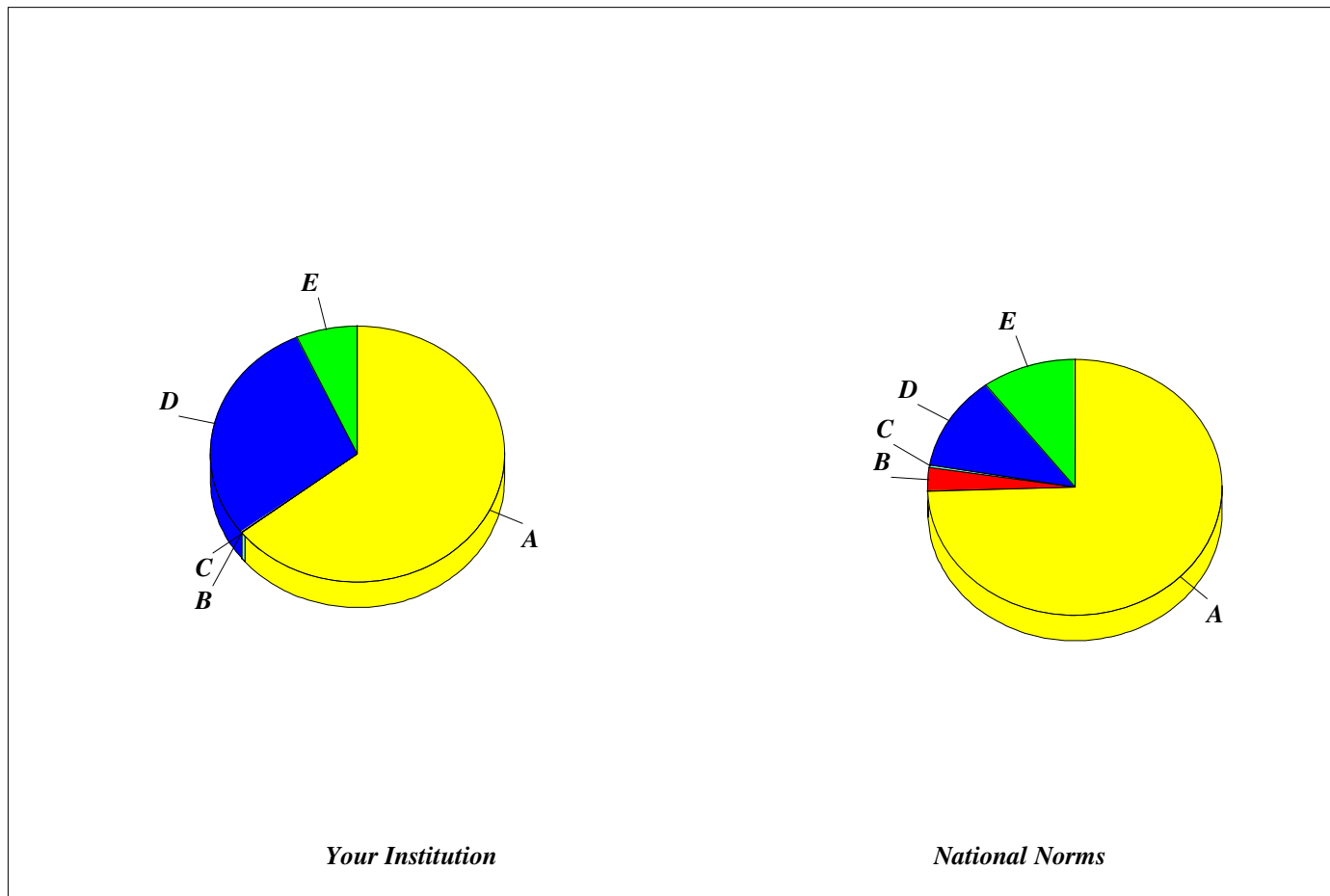


Figure 10. Section IV - Employment History, Item A: What are you currently doing?

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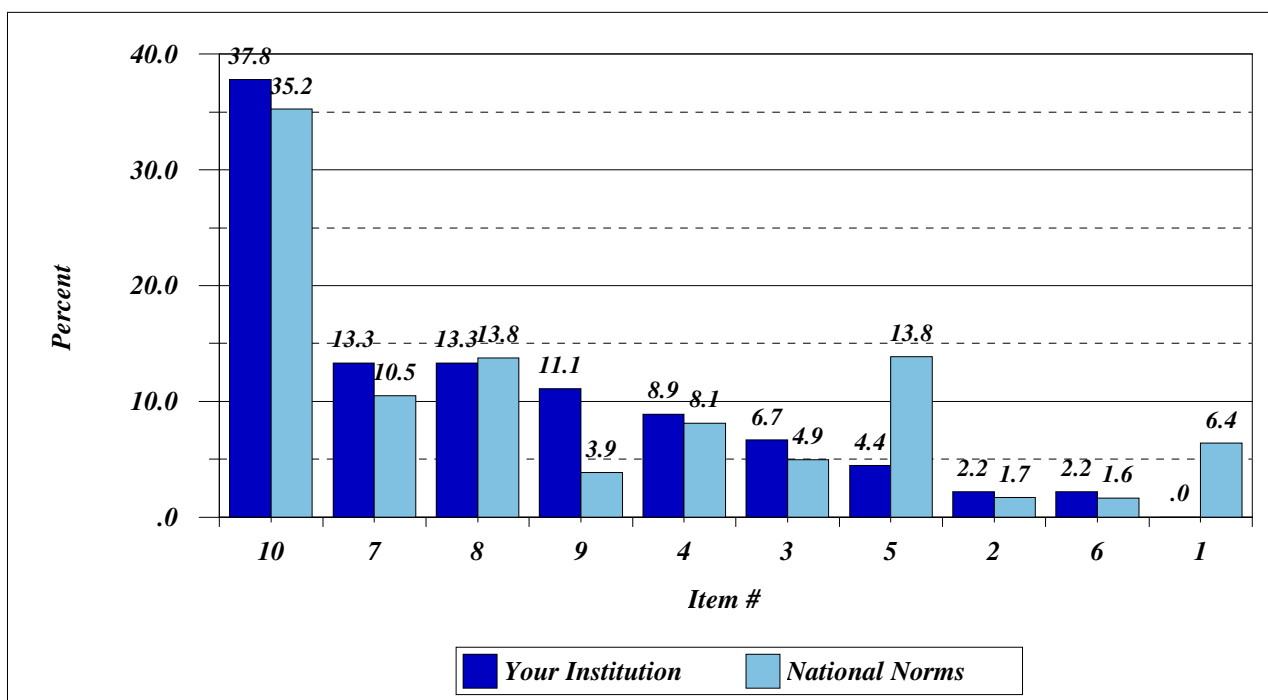


Figure 11. Section IV - Employment History, Item B:

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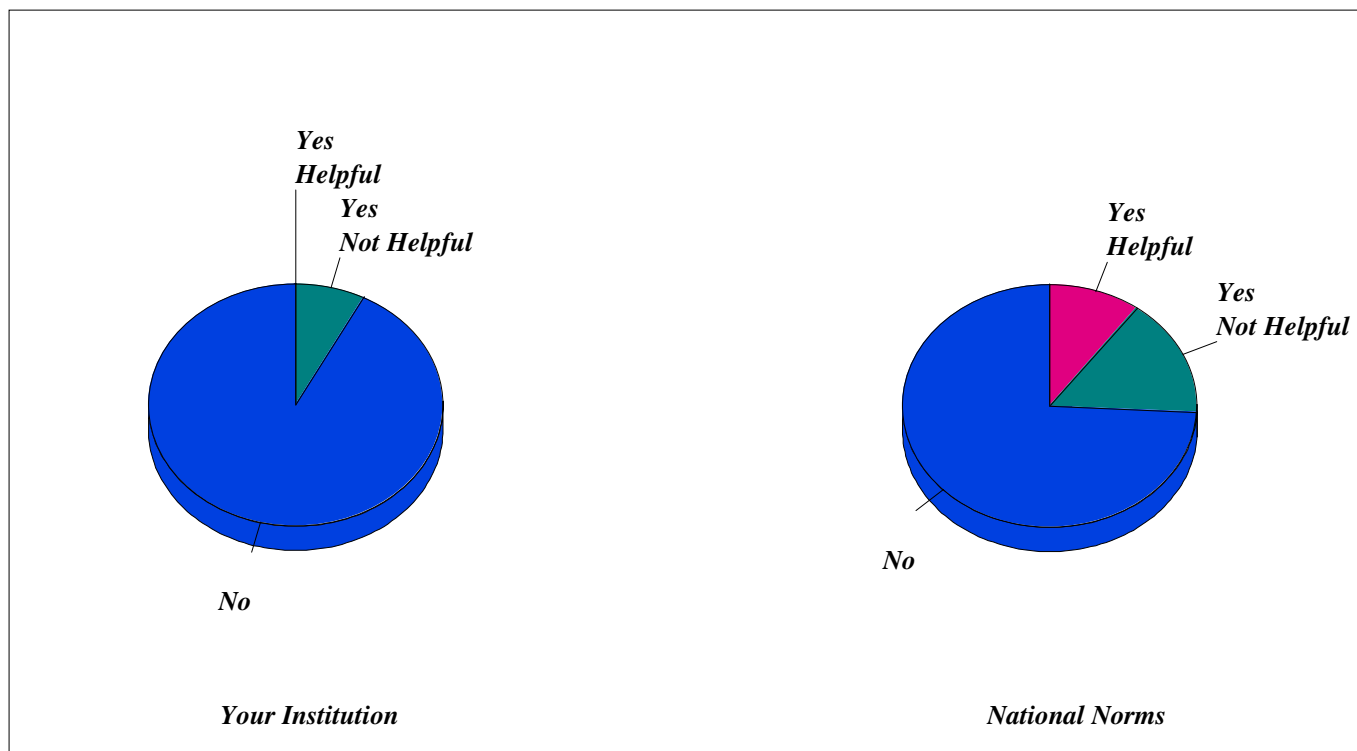


Figure 12. Section IV - Employment History, Item I: Have you sought help from this college's placement office?
